5. Project Description: a detailed description of the proposed event or project. The "First City Ambassadors" program will be comprised of qualified Oregon City history enthusiasts who will be dressed in period clothing (mid to late 1800s). They will serve as greeters and promoters of tourism for Oregon City. Modeled on successful ambassador programs such as Portland's Rosarians and the nationally recognized Certified Trained Ambassador program adopted by cities including Balitmore, MD, and Providence, RI. First City Ambassadors will offer printed information on upcoming events as well as location and hours of heritage sites and museums. They will also hand out commemorative wooden "Beaver Coins" (good for a "free" elevator ride).
6. Project Objective: How would this project help promote tourism in Oregon City? Who is the target audience?
As the "city of firsts," Oregon City's wealth of landmarks and heritage sites will be promoted to directly and personally. The target audience are current and potential tourists of Oregon City at appropriate functions and events in Western Oregon and beyond. Current and potential tourists include business travelers, convention attendees, families, groups and other individuals who will be offered a warm welcome to Oregon - home of the first city: Oregon City. This is a word of mouth-based effort to nurture a robust tourism industry in Oregon City. Ambassador have been successfully implemented and used in cities of all sizes around the nation and globe.

7. Organization Description: a detailed description of your organization.

Oregon City Heritage Coordinating Committee is a volunteer based organization with representatives from all heritage entities and communities at large. We coordinate and support individual activities and sponsor events that bring all sites and heritage groups togethers in a partnership format. As a group, we are highly qualified through our passion, knowledge and experience in promoting the rich and varied history of Oregon City.

Marge Harding - Member of the Heritage Committee; Coordinator for Living History events; Curator of Clothing and Textile Displays and Head Docent at the Ermatinger House; Organizer and participant in Pioneer Cemetary tours, heritage baseball games, the Spirits of Oregon City events and established historic clothing displays in the McLoughlin House, Stevens-Crawford Heritage House and at several other heritage sites.

Other involved members: Rocky Smith, Kathy Wiseman, Jennifer Ortiz, Heidi Pierson (NPS), and others.

Planning for this program will occur during monthy Oregon City Heritage Coordinating Committee meetings at the Pioneer Center.

Resources needed would come from individuals and our heritage partners in the community who are interested in becoming part of the First City Ambassadors program. These are individuals interested in promoting tourism and realizing the treasure of history we have in Oregon City.

The Oregon City Heritage Coordinating Committee is comprised of members who have strong ties to groups in Oregon City. Those connections will be utilized as needed in order to best serve this program and ensure its success, including information about the arrival of important guests to the city and events that would provide an opportunity for the Ambassadors to welcome and encourage future visits to our historic first city.
