OREGON CITY LIBRARY HISTORY

1843: subscription library, first in region

1845: 2nd incorporation of the Provisional Government

1850s: absorbed into Territorial Library and moved to Salem

1850s to early1900s: libraries and reading rooms come and go

1909-1910: City establishes library levy and begins official oversight of library

1913: Carnegie library opens in \$12,500 building (includes everything)



1940-1990s: rumblings about lack of space, conversations and efforts to gain space ends in 1963 renovation of 'snout' and County Library moving out of basement.







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
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OREGON CITY LIBRARY HISTORY CONT.

1995: Library moves to Hilltop

2001: Carnegie Center is renovated to look like original building, adds ADA

2008: Library District passes, providing stable funding and \$1M grant for capital improvements

2010: Lease at Hilltop lost; Library moves back into Carnegie

2010-2012: Library Board tasked with coming up with viable site



2013: After lengthy review of 30 sites, City Commission approves Library Park and Carnegie Center as site of future expansion. 2013: Decision to go out for bond in May of 2014

PAC created

May 20, 2014: Bond measure success!



Challenges unique to site

-historic building as of 2014
-library remaining on site
-community loves park, playground, and trees
-parking

OPTION 1 - 2 STORY



A 2 story option allows the playground to stay in its current spot. This option uses the original Carnegie entrance as the main entrance. The stairs are extended out, and a ramp is put in for ADA compliance.

LIBRARY INFRASTRUCTURE



Services:

-provided primarily to:

- residents of City of Oregon City
- residents of unincorporated area outside OC
- together these create our service area

-provided by:

- Oregon City Library staff
- Network, the County funded department providing centralized functions such as courier, technology, etc.
- Other libraries, through joint committees and shared collections
- together this makes up the LINCC Consortium

Funding Sources:

-Library District, which covers the entire county and apportions funds by formula
-City of Oregon City, which provides general funds and administrative services, like HR, etc.

LIBRARY INFRASTRUCTURE CONT.

Governance:

-City of Oregon City, which provides direct supervision of staff, funds, and operations

Oversight Groups:

-Library Advisory Board -City Commission of Oregon City -Library District Advisory Committee and the Board of County Commissioners, which ensure District funds are expended appropriately

Support Groups:

-Friends of the Oregon City Library -Oregon City Public Library Foundation
